## Shining lights of Lake County

### YWCA presents Women of Achievement Awards

They seek racial equality, make advances in science, education and arts and make community service a priority.

Tonight, the YWCA of Lake County will honor eight women at its 27th annual Women of Achievement Awards benefit at 6 p.m. at the Lincolnshire Marriott Resort, 10 Marriott Drive. This year's recipients are Peggy Roach of Waukegan, Christine M. Lopez of Antioch, Joan Hammel of Wildwood, DeRionne P. Pollard of Lindenhurst, Katherine E. Dong of Evanston, Karen J. Jones of Gurnee, Barbara J. Martin of Ivanhoe and Lindsey E. Kurek of Barrington. The event honors outstanding women and raises money for the YWCA, which advocates help for women and families.

"Lake County is filled with such talented women," said executive director Elizabeth Forbrich.

Honored in the arts category, Hammel began her musical career when her choir director at Warren Township High School in Gurnee chose her to perform at a wedding.

Hammel, an award-winning singer, songwriter and producer, said among her career highlights were being selected to entertain troops for the holidays and performing in Las Vegas.

Hammel, who plans to record a CD with a Netherlands record company in June, also strives to educate youth about the music business.

**Joan Hammel, Wildwood**

- An award-winning singer, songwriter and producer who has appeared on radio and television and films.

- Was the voice behind "America" a CD with songs in memory of the Sept. 11 attacks in New York City. Proceeds went to the victims of the terrorist attacks.

- Invited by the Pentagon to entertain U.S. troops at Guantanamo Bay in Cuba.

- Was part of the first all-female Awards Board of the Grammy Awards Board of Chicago, serving as vice president.

- Current president of the Friends Board for the Lake County Discovery Museum, where she helped raise more than \$120,000.

#### Dr. Dorothy I. Height Racial Justice Award

**Peggy Roach, Waukegan**

- Worked with the National Council of Catholic Women in Washington, D.C., which helped connect Catholics from Chicago with Washington civil rights activists.

- Following the signing of the Civil Rights Act, she participated in Freedom Summer, the initiative to register African Americans to vote in Mississippi.

- Also worked with Dr. Dorothy I. Height to launch "Wednesdays in Mississippi," a program developed to reduce racial tension by creating a network of women from the North and South.
- Is receiving the honor posthumously. She died April 20.



But they don't have business classes that apply specifically to music," she said. "It's a big mystery to many."

Lopez, coordinator of student recruitment at Rosalind Franklin University in North Chicago, said receiving the Promise Award signifies her devotion to community service.

"It solidifies the fact that every one needs to give back to their own community," she said.

As an undergraduate student at the University of Illinois, Lopez helped develop the "Say What?" a program, where she wrote and performed skits to middle and high school students to cope with issues they encounter in school. She also co-founded one of the first national multicultural sororities.

"We felt there was a huge need to educate people how to be tolerant of different cultures," she said. "One way was through education."

She assisted Community Youth Network at its Take A Step for Kids race and will educate girls about science and technology through the YWCAs TechGYRLS program.

"I need to be who I'm saying I want to be, playing a role in who will be our leaders for tomorrow," she said.

Described as a pioneer in the civil rights movement, Roach will be honored posthumously with the Dr. Dorothy I. Height Racial Justice Award. She died April 20. Roach participated in Freedom Summer helping register blacks to vote. She also worked with Dorothy I. Height to launch "Wednesdays in Mississippi," designed to reduce

"The light she shines is extremely bright," Forbrich said. "Young generations will be inspired by her work."

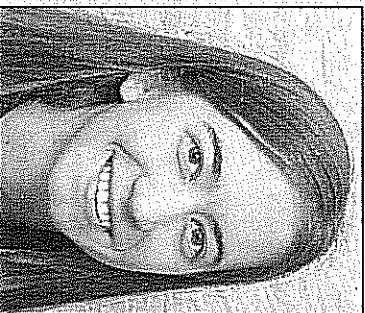
#### YWCA Young Woman of Achievement Scholarship
